Langeleben Reunion Branch Royal Signals

For forty years we had a presence at Langeleben, initially as 101 Wireless Troop, as an occupying force, housed in tents, remote from anywhere, in primitive conditions. Over the years this evolved into a shared responsibility for mutual defence in quite comfortable accommodation. Maj. Gen. Peter Baldwin, then a Lieutenant, found the site, a relic of the Berlin airlift, in 1951, since when, hundreds of us served there in various capacities. John Richardson finally handed the Camp back to the local Authority in 1992.

During the week-end of June 12th to 14th immediately after the 65th anniversary of the D Day landings, the Langeleben Reunion Branch of the RSA will be unveiling a stone to commemorate and celebrate the time we all spent at Langeleben. The theme of our celebrations will be that 'WE CAME AS AN OCCUPYING FORCE AND LEFT AS FRIENDS'. We have teamed up with the Konigsfutter Civic authority and the local Schützengilde which, together with the exhibition of "All things Langeleben" in the Rathaus, will make a fabulous weekend for those who served there.

Paul Ellis a mason at Lincoln Cathedral is carving the commemoration stone; he is the son of one of our members whose Mother was a native of Konigsfutter. I have absolutely no idea of the date in 1958 when 'THE VICAR' (seen here third from the left) arrived at Langeleben and joined "D" watch. He was billeted in the last room on the left, at the end of the top corridor, along with Bob Graham, Denis Parr, Henry Morris and Jake Todd.

I do remember he looked even younger than the rest of us at 19/20, and then we found out that he had VOLUNTEERED to serve his time EARLY, because he wished to commence his ecclesiastical training to join the Church of England. I must admit that rather set the tone of his welcome and he very quickly settled into the gang. There was the inevitable 'ribbing', but he seemed to avoid the lengthy and very serious 'gripping' process suffered by all other 'red-arsed joskin' new boys.

He was different, he did not swear, curse or blaspheme every other word, but he did smoke and drink and he was quite a regular on the reccy. truck for a night in 'Slutter. He might not have appreciated much of our language and other extremes but it never separated him from the rest of the lads. He played football for 'D' Watch and he was always on the weekend truck to the Harz Mountains – definitely one of the boys.

I never remember hearing his name, and yet he must have been on Pay Parade! When we spoke to him, it was always 'Vicar', when we spoke about him, it was always 'The Vicar', but without doubt he became one of the most popular members of the Watch.

During one of our recent reunions, Peter "Mick" Hatton, Denis Parr (and our ladies of course), we went over all the old ground, but no one knew his name. After Marlene was looking through the 58/59 photos, the only question she posed, "What was the name of The Vicar?"

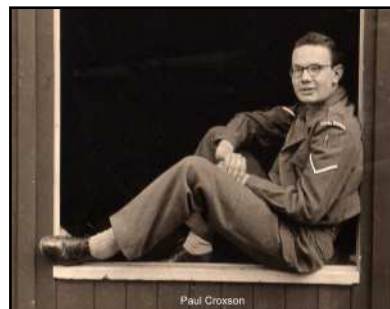
So we would like anyone who can help, please do you remember The Vicar, and what is his name? Has anyone

LANGELEBEN OUR LIVING HISTORY



It all started when I went to the Imperial War Museum to research holders of naval VC's for a book that I was writing to celebrate the 150th anniversary of the award. No! It did not: it all started

that May evening in 1955 when in the pitch black I first arrived at Langeleben. No – it did not... That's the thing about history there is no start to it and no end and this is why I wanted to call it a 'Living History'.

I recorded my own recollections of a boy living through the Blitz, V1's and V2's in South London at the Museum and, whilst waiting for Ian Hislop to finish filming for his series, I got talking to the Staff. Amazingly they have very little 'history' on the Cold War and were fascinated with what I could tell them about Langeleben. They now have a copy of JR's book (almost as rare now as a Shakespeare first folio) and, thanks to Gerry, the entire book on CD which they intend downloading and printing. A hearty 'Well done' to all those who made a contribution. Now, those who have not as yet done so, it is not too late. This is the joy of it. It is noticeable that the bulk of the contributions came in from those who served in those early days and a lot from us part-timers, the National servicemen. May I also whisper that there is a predominance of Int. Corps chaps amongst the authors/contributors; those whom Pete Ellis would refer to as the 'Fairies'. Perish the thought that I should try to introduce a spirit of competition into this project but it is important and anything is worthwhile trying. Surely outnumbering us by some ten to one this imbalance can be reversed; we

know you can all read and write – I watched (up-side-down)* you doing so for 15 months in Langeleben. As Eric Morecombe said about his piano playing when criticised by Andre Previn, “I know all the notes but it is just a question of getting them in the right order”. If this is a problem don’t worry I’ll do my best to sort out the grammar and the spelling and try to make it readable.

We have this magnificent library of photos too and the next stage is to get these off the website and off to the Imperial War Museum too. Think how dull those WWI and II programmes we are now watching would be without the photos! It won’t be long before pushy little programme makers will be fossicking around the records and surely one of them is going to come across our efforts. You will be able to say (in between sips of cocoa) to your great grand children. ”I was there you know”.

Oh, by the way, Tom Perkin has never been given the credit he deserves for getting the ‘History’ up, running and readable on the net. So, Tom, ‘thank you’.

Don’t forget, too, that Gerry has offered to let you have a CD if you do not have the luxury of broadband and want to read it. He would like a small donation which is very reasonable.

Commemoration Stone Fund

Due to some very generous donations, including £925 from the family and friends of the late Paul (Lofty) Fildes, to date the fund stands at £5663. So far we have paid out £1,608.07; this is for the raw stone, bronze plaques and an interim payment to Paul Ellis of £500. We have also to pay for the groundwork at the site, and the first year's third party insurance. We haven't got a figure yet for the groundwork but the insurance will cost some €112, this of course will be on going, year on year.
